Sounds and Smells Onboard






This guide describes the smells and sounds you will find in different parts of the ship.

There are recorded sounds and artificial smells to help us imagine what life was like on the ship when it was sailing around the world from 1840s to 1880s.

In many of the rooms you will hear lots of different sounds at the same time.

The sounds can also pass through the doorways and gaps in the floorboards, so you can hear them in more than one room.


Top Deck - Sounds ⏮

- Horse Manure

Galley:

- Fire crackling
- Clattering of pots
- Talking
- Cat and rats

Bakery:


- Fire crackling

Engine Room:

- Engine moving
- Fire crackling
- People shovelling coal and shouting

Talking Toilet:

- If you try to open the door a recorded voice of someone talking is triggered



Steerage:

- People moving and talking
- Coughing and sneezing
- Hiccoughing and snoring
- Moaning and crying
- Vomiting

- Whistling
- Musical instruments
- Paper and bottles moving
- Water splashing
- Rats

Ladies' Boudoir:

- Vomiting

Promenade Saloon:

- The sea
- Birds
- Talking, whistling and groaning
- Sounds of crew working on deck

- Smokey bacon

Bakery:


- Bread

- Musty old inn

- Coal


Ladies' Boudoir:

Lower Deck - Sounds




Forward Hold:

- Horses
- You can also hear sounds from steerage above e.g. the baby crying
- Low hum from the dehumidifier

Dining Saloon:

- The sea
- The ship's engine, propeller and bell
- People moving and talking
- Seasick passengers
- Chinking of tableware moving
- Musicians warming up

Forward Hold:

- Horse manure
